


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This striking wall hanging will brighten up any room. And it is easy to put together! Yardages are based on fabric 40" wide. All seams are 1/4" unless otherwise noted. You need no special equipment, just the normal cutting and sewing tools, though a 9 1/2" square ruler would be useful. You will need the **lightest** weight non-woven fusible you can find.

- 1. Fuse the striped fabric to stabilize what is going to be a lot of bias edges.
 - Quilt center Cut the 20" x 40" fused rectangle as shown below: The orange dotted lines indicate the direction of the stripes. The black lines are the cutting lines.
- 2. Start at each corner and cut at a perfect 45 degree angle as shown. These are rough cuts. You will be trimming them up to be perfect, but be sure to get the angle right.





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3. Shown below are the pieces that will be put in the quilt.


See all that bias. Aren't you glad you stabilized this fabric!

Separate out the 4 triangles. Trim the long edge between 1/4" and 1/2" so that the long side measures 19 3/8".

Trim them so that the long side is 19 3/8". If you have done the 45 degree angle correctly, the triangles will be 9 5/8" high.

Trim the center square to $13 \frac{1}{4}$ ".


You should have 4 triangles and 1 square.




4. Layer up the two red 10" squares with the two turquoise 10" squares, right sides together. Mark from corner to corner diagonally. Sew 1/4" away from each side of the center line. Cut in half down the center. Press the seam toward the red.

Trim to 9 1/2" square.

Make 4 blocks for the corners.



5. On each side of the striped triangles, sew an orange triangle as shown below. Trim each, if necessary, to 18 1/2" x 9 1/2", leaving 1/4" past the goose point. Make 4.






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6. On each side of the 13 1/4" square, sew a red triangle as shown below.

Trim, if necessary, to 18 1/2" square, leaving 1/4" past the square points.

Make 1.



- 7. Assemble the rows of the quilt as shown below. Sew the rows together.
- Create a sandwich of the top, batting, and backing.
 Quilt as desired.
 Bind with the bias binding.
 Hang and enjoy!!!
