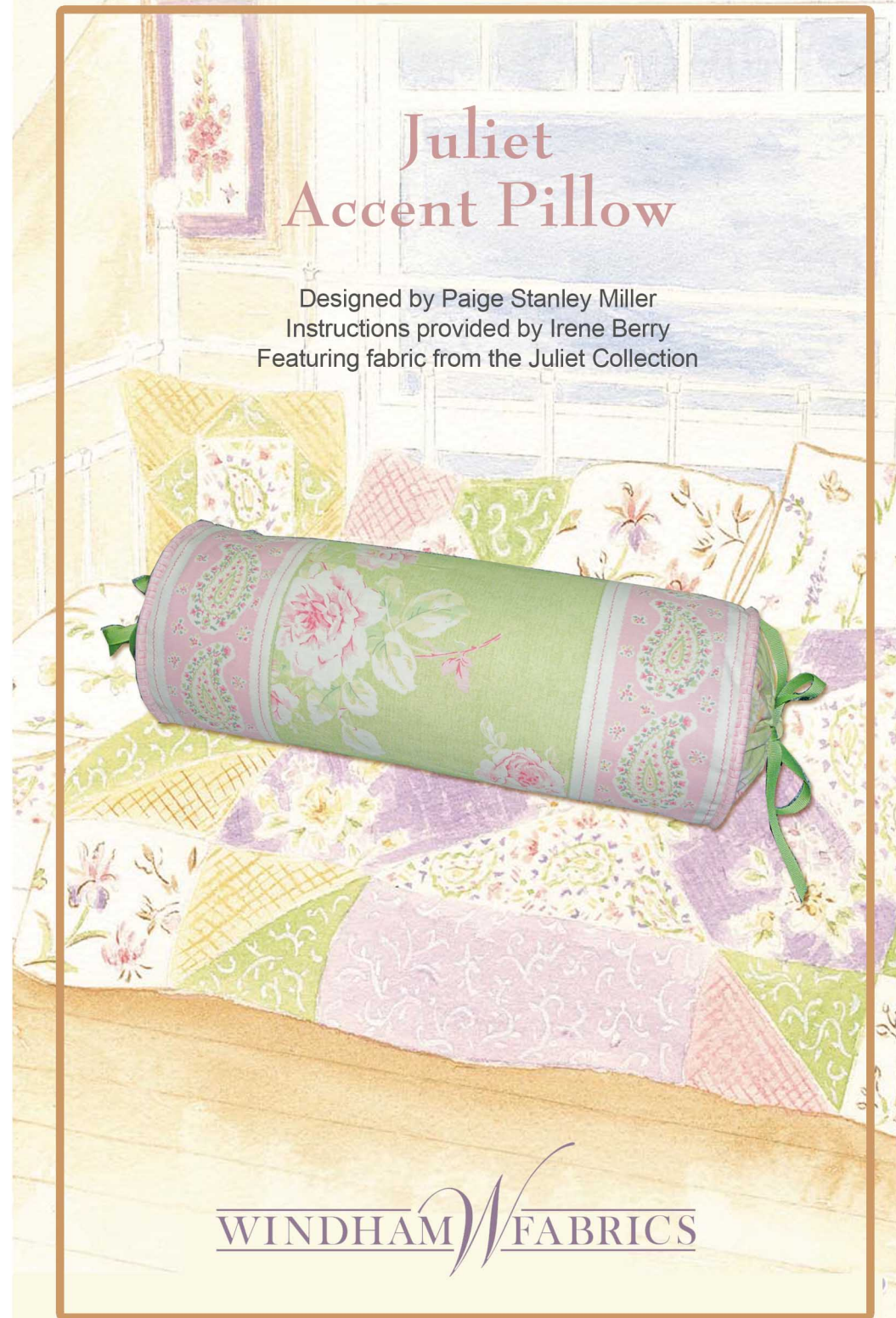
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Juliet Accent Pillow

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Supplies:

30896-3 green fat $\frac{1}{4}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ yard Juliet large flower
30897-4 pink fat $\frac{1}{4}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ yard Camille paisley stripe
30900-4 pink 14" square Rattan print/rose
44"-long $\frac{1}{4}$ " piping cord
44" -long $\frac{3}{8}$ " grosgrain ribbon
6" x 16" neck pillow form

Assembly:

Note: Sew $\frac{1}{4}$ " seams throughout this project unless instructed otherwise.

1. From the Juliet print, cut the center panel 8" x 18" and 2 end panels each 4" x 18". Referring to the pillow photo, fussy cut 2 strips from the Camille paisley stripe each 4" x 18", centering the stripe and matching the motifs. Right sides together, sew a Camille stripe to each end of the Juliet main panel.
2. To make the piping, cut the Rattan print into bias strips 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide. Join the strips end to end and press the seam allowances open. Make 2 strips, each at least 20" long. Press the strips in half lengthwise, wrong sides together.
Install a zipper foot on your sewing machine.
Tuck the cord inside the fold of the bias strip. Sew slowly, keeping the cord inside the fold and stitching as close to the cord as possible.
When finished, trim the seam allowance to $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Make 2.
3. Align the raw edge of a piping strip with the edge of the pillow panel. Pin in place and baste. Repeat for the other side.
4. Right sides together, pin a Juliet strip on top of the piping, aligning all raw edges. Stitch. Tip: For a neat, even seam, sew from the back. Still using the zipper foot, sew inside the line of basting stitches, closer to the cord. Repeat for the other side of the pillow.
Trim the ends of the piping even with the panel. Carefully, push the fabric back from the end of the piping cord and with a small, sharp scissors, snip away $\frac{1}{4}$ " of the end of the cord. Repeat for remaining ends. This will ensure a nice, flat seam when you sew the panel into a tube.
5. Right sides together, fold the panel in half, matching seams. Stitch along the long edge.
6. Make the ribbon casings. Fold under $\frac{1}{2}$ " at the end of the tube to the wrong side and press. Fold under another $\frac{1}{2}$ ", press, and pin. Topstitch close to the folded edge, leaving a $\frac{5}{8}$ " opening. Repeat for the other end. Turn the tube right side out.
7. Cut 2 lengths of ribbon, each 22" long. Trim the ends at an angle to prevent raveling. Thread a ribbon through the casing at one end. Pin a safety pin through the end of the ribbon to hold onto as you feed it through. Pull the ribbon to gather the end of the pillow as tightly as possible and tie a bow. Insert the pillow form. Thread the remaining ribbon through the casing at the other end, gather the fabric, and tie a bow.
